Program Highlights

Family, Nutrition & Health

Obesity and Childhood Obesity are huge issues for the state of Louisiana. The LSU AgCenter has many nutrition programs available to individuals and families that will help increase their nutrition knowledge, gain skills in healthy food preparation, improve eating habits and increase physical activity in order to live a healthy lifestyle. Family and Consumer Sciences is conducting a research based, technology driven program with 3rd graders throughout the state called Body Quest. This program is taking place at Sicily Island and also at Central. Programming at Catahoula Head Start is in full swing, with both students and parents receiving education nutrition lessons. The FCS nutrition educator also partners with Catahoula WIC office to pro-

vide nutrition educations and food demos once a month with WIC recipients.

4-H Youth Development



During the 2016-2017 school year, the Catahoula Parish 4-H school club program, 4th – 12th graders, was a participant in a National 4-H pilot study with 4 other states. The goals of the pilot study were to view a transformational and sustainable professional development model in different 4-H contexts and to collect and analyze formative data to be used to improve that model. Educational programs were taught each month to cover topics related to living healthier lifestyles. The 4-H Cloverbuds Program, targeting Kindergarten thru 2nd graders, also focused on healthful eating, tasting

new foods, and physical activity. 4-H youth were able to strengthen their leadership skills while teaching nutrition lessons to youth and adults as part of a joint effort between Tensas and Catahoula parishes which has received grant funding for the past 7 years. The TEN CAT: Making Families Fit program received funding through a Wal-Mart Healthy Living grant, a Healthy ABCs grant through LSU Food and Nutrition Sciences, 4-H Yoga for Kids grant, and a National 4-H mini-grant funded by the Robert Woods Johnson Foundation. Four TEN CAT teen leaders attended the National Healthy Living Summit at National 4-H in Chevy Chase. MD where they wrote a grant application for the National 4-



E H mini-grant. Through service-learning projects, youth were taught the importance of giving back to others. They participated in canned food drives, creating a therapeutic activity station at Spirit Reins Equine Center, Inc., Christmas in a Box for underprivileged youth, Christmas cards for the U. S. Military, can tab drives for St. Jude Research Hospital, dollar days for foster care and caroling at local retirement centers. Youth also participated in regional and state events throughout the year including Ag Expo, 4-H

Camp, 4-H University, livestock shows, horse shows, and healthy living trainings. Catahoula 4-H'ers were also participants in 3 other national events: the North American Invitational Livestock Exposition in Louisville, Kentucky; the 4-H Educational trip in Dallas, TX; and the National 4-Forestry Invitational in Weston, West Virginia. The Youth Wetlands project reached over 1,200 Catahoula youth and science teachers by providing materials and lessons on Louisiana wetlands.

It is the AgCenter's focus and goal to provide the people of Catahoula Parish with science-based research to address the problems and needs in the area of Agriculture & Natural Resources (ANR). These methods are carried out through a variety of production meetings, educational workshops, field days and one-on-one consultation. Among the needs of ANR are cattle and pasture management, row crops, forestry production, wildlife management, and home gardens. Cattle and pasture management information will be provided through various field days. On-farm demonstration trials will continue to be held across the parish to learn more about site specific management practices. Forest production needs are met through one-on-one consulta-

tions, as well as forums held across the state. Home garden publications can be found in our office to answer the many problems that arise throughout the growing season. Home garden enthusiasts are also encouraged to participate in Master Gardener classes that take place across the Northeast region. The LSU AgCenter remains well rooted in Catahoula Parish and looks forward to serving the needs of its residents.

Local Issues & Plans for this year.

Ag and Natural Resources: Increase productivity and profitability of Louisiana Agriculture

- Conduct crop production meetings for producers
- Conduct timber and wildlife management workshops through extension forestry
- Write news articles, newsletters, and update social media websites
- Conduct farm and home educational visits

4-H Youth and Family Development: Building strong leaders and good citizens through 4-H Youth Development

- Conduct activities to strengthen leadership skills of youth (TEN CAT Club, Livestock Program, Shooting Sports Program)
- Conduct youth programming to combat the national epidemic of childhood obesity
- Offer programming to increase communication skills of youth and engage youth in service-learning
- Promote gardening and physical activity through school and community gardens

Family and Consumer Sciences: Strengthening families and communities

- Target school age children with research based nutrition education to help combat the national epidemic of childhood obesity.
- Provide research based nutrition education to senior adults to improve their knowledge of making better food choices that will affect their overall general health, and also meet specific health needs
- Provide introductory nutrition education to pre-school aged children to begin their knowledge base of the 5 food groups and what it means to live a healthy lifestyle and eat healthy


How we are funded.
